# Dear Friends

People may think that wintertime equals quiet time for me and the garden. This year in particular that couldn't be further from the truth. We're busy here planning our winter lectures, Madoo in Manhattan featuring British garden designer **Jinny Blom**, shoveling snow and starting to order seeds for early spring planting. Oh, yes...and we've started a top-to-bottom restoration of the summer house and studio. Read more about this \$1.1 million project on the opposite page.

We are continuing to move full steam ahead. This past season we've seen remarkable growth at Madoo and we are capitalizing on our newfound popularity. Our children's programs have continued successfully for another summer season.

In August, actress **Blythe Danner** dropped by the garden to read to the kids with Josh from the Hampton Library. And, with the unseasonably warm weather, Monday Mornings at Madoo storytelling hour continued into the fall. We'll continue with new secret storytellers from time to time helping out—and it'll always be a surprise.

We finished the renovation of the sunken terrace in the spring, with a perimeter hedge of Osmanthus planted and donated by Landscape Details. We re-laid the paving and planters and painted the fences bright red and charcoal grey. This is the kind of change that's occurring throughout the garden. Over seven Saturday evenings, the newly refreshed garden was the site of a series of intimate cocktail parties hosted by Sotheby's—revealing to scores of new visitors the beauty of Madoo.

Thanks to a very generous grant from the Ala and Ralph Isham Family Foundation, we've almost completed the renovation of the pond gardens. The ponds were drained and the quarter century-old liners were removed in preparation for the redesign. With new plumbing, the ponds will share a single recirculating system, and we're adding a recharge garden where the pond water will be naturally filtered through aquaticplants. Water, we are learning, is one of our most precious resources and one that is most at risk—even here on the

East End of Long Island. This new water garden will be a showpiece of the garden and a wonderful illustration for our visitors of how a natural water system functions.

Many more projects—small and large—are in the works. As we continue to reimagine Madoo for future generations, we find ourselves celebrating the special genius of this place. Bob's creativity, found indoors and outdoors at Madoo, will find new expression in revitalized gardens and innovative programs in the near future. This is especially crucial as more and more of our guests appreciate how Madoo is an environment for promoting creative thinking in a myriad of fields.

As we begin 2017, I'm particularly thankful for your generosity and kindness in supporting Madoo. It's crucial to protect, preserve and enhance this place where children and adults alike can escape the real world and enjoy the beauty of nature.

Here's what we've been digging.

# Luciano Giubbilei:

The Art of Making Gardens Luciano Giubillei, Photography by Andrew Montgomery (Merrell, 2016).

Welcome to the mind of Luciano Giubbilei, oftentimes misidentified as a minimalist designer. He has spent several days a month for the past few years in the garden of Great Dixter, the epitome of the exuberant English garden. There, Giubbilei tends to a plot of flowers mixing colors and textures at will and learning from the surprising juxtapositions. This experience, along with that of working with craftsmen and artists, has greatly expanded his oeuvre while still retaining the purity of the Renaissance gardens he grew up with.

Louis Benech: Twelve French Gardens Eric Jansen, Photography by Eric Sander (Gourcuff Gradenigo, 2013).

To gardening or to modify—that is the question. For Benech, a plantsman par excellence, the goal is to make it seem as

if he was never there—but, of course, he was. His immense talent makes him sought-after the world over—not to give a "Benech look," but rather to bring out the best in a property. He'll suggest that a property owner trims some trees so the Mediterranean can be seen, adds another apple orchard (to mirror the existing one), or plants a parterre linking a pair of buildings. These are simple directives that make all the difference.

# Wild By Design

Margie Ruddick (Island Press, 2016).

The urge to make a garden beautiful may seem obvious to the hobby gardener. However, in academia—where the author, a Harvard-trained landscape architect teaches—aesthetic goals are not so obvious. Ruddick champions an ecologically sensitive environment centered on the human experience. Her own small garden in Philadelphia (cited at one point for being overly weed-y) is now studied as an example of cutting-edge wild gardening. Ruddick will be speaking at Madoo on March 26.



In the second half of October, we began a major historic restoration of the ca. 1740 Summer Studio & House.

The multi-faceted project will bring the building up to 21st century standards, while still retaining the creative spirit that Robert Dash established there.

The \$1.1 million project will cap the Madoo Conservancy's celebration of the 50 th anniversary of Dash's 1966 purchase of 1.91 acres of fallow Sagaponack farmland.

Bridgehampton-based Kathryn McCoy AIA is the restoration's project architect. McCoy's respectful design was approved unanimously by the Southampton Town Landmarks and Historic Districts board. The biggest change to the buildings will be the construction under the barn of a full basement for mechanicals and storage. The exterior of the studio and the adjacent house will remain the same—with new windows, doors, cedar shake siding and roofs.

Once the site was cleared, Greg D'Angelo Construction came in and dismantled much of the building preparatory to raising and digging a basement. The contractors



carefully preserved any usable materials found including 19th century barn wood that had been used as sheathing in an earlier renovation and even some locust wood posts form the original barn.

The restoration of the Summer Studio & House is the cornerstone of the Madoo Board's efforts to reinvent Madoo as a creative center for the community. The summer house will also serve as living quarters for our planned new gardeners' and artists' residency program.


